## Judge: Živko Janevski (Macedonia)

20 chess compositions participated in the tourney and the overall tourney level is good. My main criteria in judging were originality, complexity, economy and artistic merit. Owing to anticipation I excluded the following problems:

- № 7 is anticipated by E. Petite, Variantim 2006 (Appendix I);
- № 9 is anticipated by V. Rudenko \& S. Shedey, Gazeta Czestochowska 1979 (App. II);
- № 13 is anticipated by M. Lipton, $2^{\text {nd }}$ H.M. Die Schwalbe 1959 (App. III);
- № 20 is anticipated by A. Mochalkin, $3^{\text {rd }}$ Pr. Die Schwalbe 1986 (App. IV).

I propose the following ranking of the remaining problems.

$\mathbf{1}^{\text {st }}$ Prize: № 2, Dragan Stojnić (Serbia). An unbelievable combination of White Correction with white interference, changed mate after 1...Qc7 and cyclic triple avoidance. A top problem.
$\mathbf{2}^{\text {nd }}$ Prize: № 1, Dragan Stojnić (Serbia). A difficult combination of White Correction with Schiffmann defence and changed mates.
$\mathbf{1}^{\text {st }}$ Honourable Mention: № 12, Pavel Murashev (Russia). An interesting setting of White Correction, Pseudo Le Grand and changed mates. A nice flight-giving key.

$\mathbf{2 n}^{\text {nd }}$ Honourable Mention: № 3, Vladimir Sychov (Belarus). Three changed mates in an economical and well-constructed position without white pawns.

Special Honourable Mention: № 18, Nikola Stolev (Macedonia). Black Cyclic Correction and thematic tries with changed function of white moves. The keys and refutations are crude, but the effort of the author to show this difficult complex deserves attention!

## Judge: Zoran Gavrilovski (Macedonia)

I thank the organizer for entrusting me with the task of judging the \#3-section of this distinguished tourney. № 5 is anticipated by Y. Vladimirov, $1^{\text {st }} \mathrm{Pl}$. Moscow Championship 1969. Owing to the poor quantity and quality, I honoured only three problems.


Prize: № 3, Leonid Makaronez (Israel)
An old-fashioned, though still interesting and well-constructed threemover, showing changed continuations following black selfpins on d 4 in the set play, which become self-blocks after a give-and-take key. The unprovided flight $1 . . \mathrm{Kc} 4$ in the set play detracts.

## Special Honourable Mention: № 10, Živko Janevski (Macedonia)

This \#3 would have earned a Prize in spite the rather clumsy position, if its two main variations with clearances weren't similar to M. Marandyuk, $3^{\text {rd }}$ Pr. V. Melnichenko - 60 JT (Sportivna gazeta) 1999, where the WQ magnet-like moves appear both at W2 and W3: White: Kd3, Qc8, Re4, Rg2, Ba2, Bh2, Sa5, Sa6, Pd6 (9) / Black: Kd5, Qb8, Ra8, Rc7, Bd7, Sa1, Sh7, P: b3, b5, b7, e3, g5, g6 (13); 1.Rgg4! [2.Re5+ K:d6 3.Rd4\#], 1...Rc4 2.Qc5+(A) R:c5 3.Sb4\#, 1...Bf5 2.Qe6+(B) B:e6 3.Rd4\#, 1...Sc2 2.B:b3+ Rc4 3.Qc5\#(A), 1...Sf6 2.R:g5+ Bf5 3.Qe6\#(B), 1...Rc3+ 2.Q:c3 Q:d6 3.Qd4\#

Honourable Mention: № 8, Zlatko Mihajloski (Macedonia)
Rendering of the $8^{\text {th }}$ WCCT theme, which deserves its place in the award for its two tries refuted by the thematic variations.

Three studies were cooked or had duals:

The uncontested leader of the tourney. The stalemate with lock-out of the bishop is familiar, but here this idea is realised in a crystal clear manner in a new position!

## Judge: Diyan Kostadinov (Bulgaria)

I received 17 anonymous problems from Aleksandar Popovski, which participated as originals in the selfmate section of the Meeting of solidarity 2009 tourney. Actually, one of the problems was a traditional threemover (not a selfmate problem) and was excluded from the tournament. I did not include in the award one interesting problem for the reason that the same problem has taken part in the $8^{\text {th }}$ WCCT and was published in the list of WCCT entries in the official site of PCCC.

The quality of the awarded problems is good. The ranking is as follows:

$\mathbf{1}^{\text {st }}$ Prize: № 18, Živko Janevski: Beautiful problem with a nice Queen sacrificial key and which shows a good combination of thematic try, Umnov, black selfblocks, and three different Queen mates after unpins of the black Queen.
$\underline{\mathbf{2 d}^{\text {nd }} \text { Prize: №6, Eugene Fomichev: Rich thematic content - White battery play, creation of }}$ black batteries after underpromotions, but unfortunately in the first variation we have a transformation of the white R-B battery into B-R battery whereas in the second variation there is creation of a new white battery, which is inharmonious from an aesthetic point of view.
$3^{\text {rd }}$ Prize: № 5, Zoran Gavrilovski: AB-BC-CA cycle of white $2^{\text {nd }}$ and $3^{\text {rd }}$ moves is nothing new under the sun, but here this is shown in a very nice combination with thematic tries in which defences from the solution appears as refutations.


Honourable mention: № 11, Henryk Grudziński: Good realisation of opening of white lines, passive annihilations and pins of black pieces.

Commendation: № 16, Živko Janevski: Triple play of black P-Q battery, white R-B battery play and dual avoidance.

## Judge: Nikola Stolev (Macedonia)

There were 43 problems participating in the tourney, which I received from the tourney director without authors' names. The following are incorrect: № 6 (1.e5 g3 2.e4 Bc8\#), № 7 (1.R:h3 Qa1/a2 2.Rh1/Rh2 Qh1/Qh2\#) and № 19 (1.e2 Bf3+ 2.K:f5 Se7\#). I thank Mr Ž. Janevski on indicating the following anticipations. № 20 - anticipated by Nikolay Dolginovich, Mezija 1997; № 29 - anticipated by Horst Böttger, Comm. Diagrammes 2003; and № 30 - anticipated by Toma Garai, $4^{\text {th }}$ Pr. Szachy 1989.

Most of the problems explore familiar problem motifs or have constructional weaknesses. For example, № 1 has differently motivated capture of white pieces; № 9 lacks a pin mate in d); the author of № 25 uses three black knights, which is not justified given the symmetrical play therein; exchange of white or black moves (in №s 27 and 32 respectively) without a new motif is not sufficient for a place in the award; № 33 shows cyclic Zilahi by switch of b) and c) twins, however this is not sufficient for it to be ranked. №s 41 and 42 were already published in Orbit 2006 (№ 1718) and 2009 (№ 2607).

Thus, only certain problems were eligible for the award, in particular the prize winning entries following.

$\mathbf{1}^{\text {st }}$ Prize: № 15 , Vitaly Medintsev: Clear rendering of three pairs of solutions, of which two pairs of mating moves are repeated, however following different problem motifs. The author's conception has led to a heavy position, but this is the best achievement in the tourney.
$\mathbf{2}^{\text {nd }}$ Prize: № 14, Vitaly Medintsev: Yet another TF problem with two pairs of matching solutions, in which the author successfully incorporated dual avoidance. An excellent achievement.
$\mathbf{3}^{\text {rd }}$ Prize: № 43, Živko Janevski: The author shows transformation of batteries with exchange of roles of the black Queen and Knight in an excellent setting.

$\mathbf{1}^{\text {st }}$ Honourable mention: № 34, Zlatko Mihajloski: Dual avoidance due to check to w.K, in combination with black half-pin and enriched by mutual interference by black line pieces on the c-file.
$\mathbf{2}^{\text {nd }}$ Honourable mention: № 37, Zoran Gavrilovski: Triple pin mates, achieved following reciprocal change of squares of self-pin ( d 4 and d 5 ) with reciprocal white moves. The idea has been rendered before, however this problem shows it without twins.
$\mathbf{1}^{\text {st }}$ Commendation: № 28, Ivan Borisenko \& Vitaly Shevchenko: A pleasant and wellconstructed problem in which white knights are captured for the purpose of opening the mating lines. The idea has been seen before, however here for the first time white knights are the thematic white pieces (compare with problem I in the Appendix).
